I called all the young people together, gang members, drug addicts, college boys and girls, staff members, and told them that the Center was safe. There was a great rejoicing. ‘I think we ought to go into the chapel and thank God,’ I said. So we did.... Finally someone looked up and asked: ‘Say David, where did the money come from?’ ‘Oh, it hasn’t come yet.’ Twenty-five blank expressions. Twenty-five frozen smiles. ‘It hasn’t come in yet...but by September 10th, I’ll have a check for \$15,000 to show you.
